"Mom" Thorpe has a theory. And, like all good theories, it is based on facts.

"My job," says Mom, "is not to cure delinquents. It's to prevent them."

"Take Johnny, for instance. Johnny was not a bad boy when he came to our Home. But he was a perpetual truant - one of the paths that eventually leads to delinquency. Johnny would rather be any other place than in school. He was bright, eager, explorative, always brimming over with energy. The first week after Johnny came to us, he truanted as usual. We had to bring him back from Canada where he had bummed his way 'to see the sights'. Yes, Johnny was a problem."

"And there was Anabelle, the timid child with all sorts of hidden frustrations. And Dick with his bullying cockiness. And Paul ... and Harry .. Dozens, hundreds of red-heads and blonds and freckle-faces - each one with problems of his own. Each with problems which had to be solved, if ever the child was to amount to anything."

"What do we do about them? How do we overcome these teenage tensions which come to every boy and girl no matter who they are or where they live?"
