It Might As Well Be Spring:

How to play the extended chords on the accordion

This tune sounds best if you can go beyond the left-hand chords with dedicated accordion buttons. But it only has two types of chords that require combining left-hand buttons. Here's how you can play the chords in this lead sheet:

<u>GMaj7</u> – this chord adds an F# note to the G Major chord. Perhaps easiest is to play the similar-sounding GMaj9 chord by playing the G Major and D Major chord buttons at the same time.

<u>Am7</u> – Hold down the A counter bass note (top of the F row). Add the C Major chord button close by – the notes, A, C, E, G make an Am7.

<u>Bm7</u> – Similarly, combine the B counter bass note (top of the G row) with the D Major chord button.

<u>Dm7</u> – Combine the D counter bass note (top of the Bb row) with the F Major chord button.

CMaj7 – play a C Maj9 by combining the C Major and G Major chord buttons

<u>C°</u> - this is just a way of writing a C-dim chord. No special tricks!

<u>Em7</u> – Combine the E counter bass note (top of the C row) with the G Major chord button.

<u>F#m7</u> – Combine the F# counter bass note (top of the D row) with the A Major chord button

Bb° - a Bb-dim chord
